

# Kahn Tailoring: The Story of an Immigrant Business in Indianapolis

A special pop-up exhibit in conjunction with the National Council on Public History meeting in Indianapolis

From 1903 until the 1950s, Kahn Tailoring was a major men's clothing business located at 800 North Capitol Street in downtown Indianapolis. Over the years that the business flourished, Kahn hired thousands of newly arrived Sephardic Jewish immigrants to work in his factory.
